

## **AIM-Progress Statement on Mutual Recognition of Virtual Assessments**

## **Evolution of the supply chain assessment landscape**

With Covid-19 disrupting AIM-Progress members' responsible sourcing on-site audit activities, companies are looking to new technological capabilities to safely continue to monitor supplier compliance and drive engagement practices.

In particular, **virtual remote assessments**, coupled with direct worker engagement practices, are replacing many traditional on-site supplier audits where markets are restricted to auditors or sites are not allowing access to outside individuals. Today this is mainly for follow-up audits and closing non-compliance gaps, but we anticipate more frequent use for initial and periodic full audits in the future.

As virtual assessments are not suitable for all types of situations, AIM-Progress is also looking into the potential of **hybrid approaches** where parts of the assessment are taking place on-site whilst others are led remotely.

AlM-Progress members believe that disruption of supply chains will continue well into the future, and that both virtual assessments and hybrid approaches will play a role in the "toolbox" of supplier assurance approaches. As we have seen with on-site audits, there is a risk of diverging protocols and standards for virtual assessments, leading to potential duplication of supplier assurance efforts.

## **Enabling mutual recognition of virtual assessments**

AIM-Progress has already adopted a framework for mutual recognition of on-site audits.

We will extend this approach to virtual assessments. This means that **our members agree**, in principle, to recognize supplier virtual remote assessments completed on behalf of another company, and will review assessment reports to confirm whether they meet member's own internal company requirements.

Just like for on-site audits, suppliers are therefore encouraged to share their assessment reports directly with AIM-Progress member companies upon request, or upload them via the relevant data sharing platform.

AIM-Progress members shall encourage and promote suppliers' sharing of virtual assessment results while retaining the following rights<sup>1</sup>:

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> The decision on whether to fully accept a virtual assessment or require additional elements or request a new virtual assessment will largely depend on the local situation regarding accessibility of supplier sites. In certain cases a "hybrid approach", involving on-site worker interviews carried out by the auditor or one-day site visits may be an appropriate solution and provide additional level of assurance.

- 1. To accept or not accept any part of an assessment.
- 2. To require additional follow-up or a full virtual assessment at a timing of their choosing.
- 3. To require additional on-site assessment/auditing at a timing of their choosing.

## Our common baseline for virtual assessments

Our common baseline for what we deem to be a good standard for virtual assessments is the <u>Sedex Virtual Assessment</u> (SVA). A large majority of AIM-Progress members are members of Sedex. They have contributed to establishing the SVA standard and are using this new protocol for virtual assessments. We therefore recommend the SVA as a good standard of practice against which to compare any other virtual assessments which suppliers may have undergone, or benchmark against any own-company assessment standards that they may have developed.

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
